SAFEGUARDING STUDENTS ONLINE:
REMOTE LEARNING POLICY FOR
STUDENTS

Revised: June 2021



SGSE's approach to Safeguarding and Child Protection continues to follow Keeping Children Safe in Education (2021) and other DfE Statutory Guidance. During times when our school is operating differently to normal, our Safeguarding principles and procedures remain the same.

At SGSE, the best interests of the child always come first. If we as a school have concerns regarding any child/family/incident, we will continue to act as soon as we possibly can. A Designated Safeguarding Lead is available to receive contact should they be needed and our students should continue to be protected whilst online.

During this time, we appreciate students are likely to be spending greater amounts of time on computers and electronic devices, and as such we need Parents/Guardians to remain vigilant and assist children regarding online safety, as the risks of online bullying, grooming, abuse (including peer on peer abuse) are potentially heightened.

SGSE subscribe to National Online Safety who help schools meet their statutory safeguarding and curriculum requirements through comprehensive online safety programme for educators, parents and children.

Parent/Guardian Support

We as a School request that Parents/Guardians have regular discussions with your child, and are aware of what your child is being asked to do in relation to their remote learning, including:

- sites they will be asked to use;
- school staff their child will interact with;
- set age-appropriate parental controls on digital devices and use internet filters to block malicious websites;
- ensure younger children's access to computers or mobile devices is supervised;
- set limits on the amount of screen time their children have each day;
- monitor and discuss online interactions and the appropriateness of their interactions with peers (and others) on all forms of social media/networking sites/gaming sites;
- report concerns immediately.

If a student is suspected of causing harm to another pupil, the School will seek advice from Birmingham Safeguarding Children's Partnership as to how best manage and investigate the concern, as well as ensuring support for the victim during any period of school closure.

We want to support you in creating a safe online environment for your child, so that they feel safe and secure both academically, socially and emotionally.
